| San Diego | County uses split sentencing at 24% | Received \$100 million of AB 900 to build 400 women's beds. | Gender-responsive jail to answer the needs of women. | Fail | Stop construction of new jail and invest in affordable housing, jobs training, and other alternatives to incarceration |

| Riverside | Home detention. | Project 1: 1,273 bed replacement facility. Project 2: Applying for \$80 million for new 582 bed jail. | Population growth. The Current jail is old. | San Mateo | Some county based alternatives. | Project 1: 840 bed jail. Project 2: Applying for \$20 for a 46-bed facility. | Green jail, gender-responsive jail for women, programming space high-security housing, administrative segregation. | Double Fail | Do not build a new jail and invest in affordable housing, jobs training, alternatives to incarceration. |

| San Bernardino | Early release work program. | Project 1: \$120 to expand the Glen Helen Rehabilitation Center. Project 2: adding 1,368 beds at Adelanto Detention Center costing \$144 million. Project 3: \$4.3 million to expand the West Valley Detention Center | Do not build a new jail and invest in affordable housing and jobs training. | Fail | Do not build new jail, invest in alternative to incarceration. |

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
